



Dark blue cloth, with gilt-stamped spine titles. No dust jackets (as issued). Top page edges gilt. Folded maps are in pocket attached to the back fixed endpaper of vol. 1. The appendices contain extensive detail information about the people involved. The American Field Service "anticipated American troops on the battlefields of France and the Balkans by more than two and a half years; it contributed appreciably during these years to the enlightenment of American opinion in regard to the crucial meaning of the war; it furnished subsequently to the American Expeditionary Forces a small nucleus of officers and men of quality and devotion; and last, but not least from the viewpoint of its members, it had the happy fortune of serving with and being part of the matchless armies of France." 


**3. A Democratic Peace Offered for the Acceptance of Pennsylvania Voters.** Philadelphia: Union League of Philadelphia, 1864. 13, [3] p.; 23 cm. Stitched; wrapper included in pagination. The Union League of Philadelphia, founded in 1862 to support the Union cause and Abraham Lincoln during the Civil War, established a Publications Board in Feb. 1863 and immediately began publishing pro-Union pamphlets. This pamphlet was number 81, distributed in September 1864 in support of Lincoln as he ran for re-election against the Democratic nominee, General George B. McClellan. 

George Bruce Malleson (1825-1898) was an English author who served with the British army in India from 1842 to 1877. 

Journalist William Swinton (1833-1892) wrote The War for the Union: The First, Second, Third and Fourth Years of the War, which was published in Sept. 1864 by the Loyal Publication Society, New York. The Union League of Philadelphia, founded in 1862 to support the Union cause during the Civil War, established a Publications Board in Feb. 1863. It published this pamphlet as The War for the Union from Fort Sumpter to Atlanta, later in 1864, as its pamphlet number 82. Aimed at the 1864 presidential election, the concluding paragraphs warn that one of the political parties supports the Jefferson Davis "and his crew." Sabin, Bibliotheca Americana, 94085n. 



Douglas Wyeth, was at the address given, 7 Pear St., Philadelphia, from 1841 to 1857. Former owner's inscription on front free endpaper. A popular work by Scottish Puritan, Thomas Boston (1676-1732). 

The author, William Howitt (1792-1879), was an English birthright Quaker who became interested in the Spiritualist movement in the 1840s, resigning from the Society of Friends in 1847. Scarce. 

At head of title page and on front wrapper: Drames de l'Amérique du Nord. Publisher's catalog on back wrapper. Part of the publisher's series Collection Michel Lévy. Advertisement for Marie de Granfort by Chevalier on page facing title page. Faint armorial stamp on front wrapper. Stamp on title page with a crown above "Egeskov Bibliothek." The author, Henri Emile Chevalier (1828-1879), came to North America following the 1851 coup d'état in his native France. Although he returned to France following the 1860 amnesty, he published quite a few novels featuring Native Americans, including La Huronne, first published in Paris in 1861. Very scarce. In Good+ Condition: lacking some paper over spine; minor loss at two corners of front wrapper, which is creased; text block is separated between p. 96 and p. 97; small discoloration on front wrapper; occasional foxing in lower page margins; otherwise, pages are clean and intact. 

Paperback with turquoise covers. *Signed by the author on the half title page.* A pair of private investigators in Boston who "fly in the face of institutionalized bigotry and corruption" and "question the definition of 'racially motivated incidents'" to solve the case. This was the first novel by Dennis Lehane, who wrote for the HBO series *The Wire* and went on to write novels that were the basis of the films *Mystic River*, *Shutter Island*, and *Gone, Baby, Gone*. A scarce signed advanced reader's copy of his first book. In Very Good Condition: discoloration along spine; upper corner of back cover creased; clean and tight. (#006222) \$225.00



Her first, The Social Lion, was a barely fictionalized account of Chicago's high society, published when she was only 16 and promptly suppressed by her family. 



Caroline Fox (1819-1871), a member of an English Quaker family, recorded her observations of prominent scientists and intellectuals of her time, including John Stuart Mill and Thomas Carlyle. Her father, Robert Were Fox (1789-1877), was a geologist and inventor. In Very Good+ Condition: edges lightly rubbed; slightly cocked; minor loss at head of spine; clean and tight. 



The life of Aleister Crowley (1875-1947), the English occultist, magician, poet, and painter who founded the religion of Thelema. In 1898 he joined the Hermetic Order of the Golden Dawn; studied Hinduism and Buddhism in India; while honeymooning in Egypt in 1904 claimed that he was contacted by a supernatural entity named Aiwass; and in 1912 joined the Ordo Templi Orientis. 



The author, Victor Henri Rochefort, Marquis de Rochefort-Luçay (1831-1913), was a journalist and dramatist who was elected to the lower house of the French parliament in 1869. Following the revolution of 1871 he was arrested and sentenced to transportation to New Caledonia, which is where this volume ends. Following the general amnesty in 1880 he returned to France, where he continued to be actively involved in his country's political life. In Very Good- Condition: edges are rubbed; spine is sunned; cover is lightly soiled; title page foxed; otherwise, clean and tight. (#006220) \$24.00
